



SALES DEPARTMENT

We again ask your cooperation in checking circuits carefully. Errors continually occur. Usually they cost the Club. Since no member of that group uses those two letters as a signature it appears that the circuit was shown to some non-members and that the member responsible either never collected or forgot to include it in his report. We need material of all types, particularly all off-cover both 19th & 20th Century and the better grade covers.

Please, also, try hard to keep circuits nov-

ing on schedule.

ADDITIONS TO LIBRARY

Thanks to Mr. Heyliger deWindt, co-author, the Club's Library now has a copy of the book, "20th Century United States Fancy Cancellations" by Loso & deWindt and thanks to Mr. Burleigh Jacobs a copy of Bulletin #5 of the Wisconsin Postal History Society, "Nineteenth Century Fancy Cancellations of Wisconsin". PREPARING MATERIAL FOR THE QUARTERLY

You have undoubtedly noticed that some of our illustrations do not show up perfectly. Some times this is because we try to use the original cover or piece as an illustration but usually it is from the use of pencil drawings. Neither photograph too well since there is not enough contrast. However, the black ink drawings on white or nearly white paper do turn out so much better that we hope you will use that method whenever possible.



OF THE ROARING 1920's

In our quarterly Number 3, Volume I, dated October 1951, I recalled, after many years, the now historic Sharon (Pennsylvania) cancels which I engraved for the assistant Postmaster at the time. Fred Shartle.

I wrote the article entirely from memory, and not even having a set of the covers bearing the cancels at the time. I tried very hard to bring to mind, and set down on paper the smallest detail which might be of interest to those collectors aspiring to complete the set.

At the age of sixty plus, the mind recalls much that is not important, and, on the other hand, is foggy on many things that are really important.

I thought at the time our article appeared, bearing information by memory, and much with the help of friends, that it was complete as to listing and illustrations. But recently Mr. Heyliger deWindt, of Wolfeboro, N. H., presented me with one of his priceless books on the wild orgy of cancellations of the 1920's.

You will remember the cancels bobbed up

all over our land like mushrooms due to the Postal Department's ruling that NO TOWN CAN-CELS, hereafter, MUST BE USED ON THE FRONT of ANY REGISTERED LETTER OR PACKAGE.

I was flabbergasted to see in Mr. DeWindt's exhaustive report, TWO designs, and perhaps the scarcest of all, that I had engraved and entirely forgotten.

The first cancel I made was a cork design, slightly oval, (See figurel,) and was mostly cut with a safety razor blade, following, largely, and grain of the bark, and which suggested a leaf design. It was first used, according to Mr. DeWindt's research, on July 16th, 1927. It soon crumbled, as I remember, and I made a cork Masonic design listed in our first article.

Then (see figure 2,) the other cancel which I had overlooked was what I called a sunrise. Or it could be just as well a sunset. But I smiled, wryly, as I read Mr. deWindt's description of an "off-centre pie". However in these days of impressionistic art, just take your choice!

Now please add these two to your list and you will have ten designs. COMPLETE. I think. But to misquote my herok General MacArthur, I might say, "Old philatelists never die, they just can't remember."

AWARD FOR CAMCELLATIONS




