



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# ILLUSTRATED ON FRONT PAGE

All eleven illustrations from Gen. Bonesteel's Collection are on the 2¢ Vermilion, all drawn to size and all in black except #s 10 & 11 which are blue. #2 which appears to be a Worcester, Mass. Cancel is included for the purpose of learning the highest number used in this cancel. #8 the Boston Oval has a star in the center. We believe this is unusual. Further information about any of these cancellations would be welcomed by Gen. Bonesteel and your Editor and will be printed here.

The Elizabeth, N.J. Bird from Mr. Paul R. Mines is in black on a cover to London franked with Scott #70. The other six all are on #65 and all are black. Mr. Mines states that he has seen Cancels similar but certainly not the same to all but the "jointed fly" and the "hour glass". Can any of you supply further information about any of these Cancellations?

## ILLUSTRATED ON PAGE 64

#10 is the French Anchor which is found on the stamps of many countries including USA. having been noted on #65 at least. #1 is from Danzig; #s 2 & 3. Japan; #4, Belgium; #5, Brazil; #6, Peru, #7, Guatemala; #8, Canada; #s 9 & 11, England; #12, Finland, #13, Germany; #14, Bulgaria; #15 Cuba; #16, Trinidad.

# ILLUSTRATED ON PAGE 66

These Cancellations are on Treasury Department Stamps and all are black unless otherwise noted. They are from the Collection of Mr. Charles R. Kihnley. We believe most of them have been illustrated before but perhaps the use on the Treasury Dept. Stamps may be new information to many of you.

Since it was felt that other celebrations in Oklahoma City left too little time for its program the Committee in charge decided to accept the invitation of Durants, Okla, to hold the exhibition there. Durants is one of the few remaining cities on the old Butterfield Stage Route. Dates for the Cover Display have been set for Sept. 14 & 15. The City also plans two days of pageantry including a run over a part of the old route by a replica of the old stage coach. As we get further information we will pass it along to you.

Bruce W. Ball (234) writes that he is having 35mm color transparencies made of Florida Covers in his and other collections hoping to have them available for Club Meetings and other such gatherings. He is interested in obtaining, for photographing, by purchase or loan, covers which he lacks. Also states that his own covers are available for similar purpose.



# EARLIEST KNOWN USE OF USA #220

Lewis Leigh (362) reports that he recently found a cover on which Scott #220 was tied by the usual target cancel and town postmark of "Mine Run, Va. Jan. 30, 1890". Since the date of issue of this stamp now listed in Scott's U S Specialized is May 12, 1890 this cover has been submitted to them and Mr. Leigh states that the new date will be listed in the next edition of the Specialized catalogue. Mine Run was a small Post Office in Orange County, Va. The cover was addressed to Mr. O. G. Crawford, Lorton Valley, Fairfax Co., Va.

Ralph A. Palmer (286) recently sent in a clipping from the Chicago Daily News which proves that Helicopter Mail is serving suburban Chicago well. One route served is called "Charlie Route" and is a triangle serving 14 communities and is 93 miles which is covered in an hour and 45 minutes. 

# New York Foreign Mail Cancellations 1870-1876

Types and Stamps of Special Interest

Collectors will be most interested in those types, quite pleasing to the eye, included in the group for the first time.

71N, a "patent" cancellation (punch variety), is of particular interest. This is the only definitely identified "patent" New York For-eign Mail, although 71NN and 74N are believed to be such. Illustrations and descriptions of "patents" from the studies of F. R. Schmalzreidt are found in Scott's Specialized U.S. Good strikes of the elaborate geometrics and stars stand out and are most sought for together with the starred anchor number 91. A number of types were in use for a very short time; only a few examples of these are known.

N. Y. F. Mail cancellations are particularly scarce on the 1, 2, 3 and 90c values. A few have been found on Department stamps, viz., one each on Post Office and Navy, two on State. The following are reported on Supplementary Mail covers 38, 52, 74, 99. Used on mail other than first class 7, 14, 39, 47, 50, 70, 86.


More are found on the 6c Lincoln than on any other value, and of course its pink ground together with

course its pink ground together with the red 7c and orange 15c show strikes in black most effectively.

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
