## BIENNIAL ELECTION & DUES



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## NUMERAL CANCELS by Edward L. Willard

In USCC NEWS #39 for March, 1959 on page 56 is a reference by Dr. de Wasserman to illustration 83 of his article with the thought that I might know its origin. I do not. I have seen half a dozen copies but the closest I ever came is illustrated herewith. The town name ends in "et" and the State in "N" hence it could be Minn., Tenn. or Conn. Because of the origin of the lot my wild guess is Conn.

Now for some of my own "unknowns": Berks County is in Pennsylvania. I have a cover from Yardld in that county but with a cork "Y". Maybe this is a later device. The fancy "I" is said to be from Oakland, Calif. but I am not sure. The "27" looks like the old Boston set on 3¢ Greens but is not the same. The "5" might be Washington, D.C. Does anyone have any proof? If so please notify the Editor or Mr. Willard.



Editor's note: Mr. Willard has sent us a list of 179 towns which used sets of numerals as cancellations on #210. Many of these towns used more than one set so that he has in his collection 288 sets which could be traced off on this one stamp. If interest in these sets is great enough we believe Mr. Willard could be persuaded to trace them. Please let us know.





20th CENTURY CANCELS ARE FUN! by Bob Pritchard; 22| LeGrande Bivd., Aurora, || 11.



Our collector friend is now definitely interested and enthusiastic about his new 1938 Presidential cancellation collection with his different types of target and oval cancels and now would like to add the easilly obtainable but very intriquing "Hammer or Ellipse" Cancels. There are three different types of the so-called, by postal employees, "Hammer or Ellipse Cancels" and all are easily identifiable by their elliptical, characteristic shapes. The first has a circle containing a single number which has a heavy outline frame which becomes thicker at the two, opposite end sections, of the circle, and the two, opposite end sections then extend out with several horizontal bars which bars shorten to a point on each end. The second type is almost the same as the first, containing the number and the same circular shape, but only is different in that it has a second circular ring within the first circle thus making this a "Double Circle Hammer type cancel". The third and last type differs in that it is just a single number enclosed at the top and bottom sides by four horizontal bars which shorten to a point at each end. The normal size for this cancellation is about 34 millometers in height and 14 millometers at width however many are found a little larger and some smaller. Usage of this cancel takes place, at the applicable division of a postoffice, when an envelope, letter is to bulky, and not flat, to pass through the machine cancellation machines and necessitating the use of this hand cancel stamp.

While it is to be seen that this "Hammer or Ellipse type cancel" is small enough to appear on a single stamp, and this is the way that it is collected to represent this type, it is important to note that this type of cancel is only a part of an entire cancel in that when this type of cancel is applied it will also have a circular "on the nose" type cancel which will include the date unless circular mailing or it might have a "Wiggle" or "Jail" running bar cancel included with it to make the entire cancel as the "Hammer or Ellipse type cancel" is only a part of an entire cancel on the envelope.

The "Hammer or Ellipse type cancel" is applied by a handstamp which resembles a hammer end and this is the reason for the name given it by some postal employees and others call it an "ellipse cancel" because of its shape.

Of the three types of "Hammer or Ellipse cancels" each has a number within the circle or within the horizontal bars and this number is usually a lower number as whatever number is used usually designates a section of the postoffice as for example a number "|" might be from the first class division of the postoffice and a number "2" from the second class division and a number "3" from the third class, etc., and if a higher number were found it would just mean that the postoffice, of which this cancel was from, had many divisions of mailing so consequently the higher number for the more divisions of that specific postoffice, A collector. when he is collecting a series of cancels as the Presidential series, trys to collect a set of all "i's", "3. s", etc., and a completed set of cancels is a collector's pride.

The legality for this type of cancellation which includes the single number is found in Section 332 4 of the Postal Manual of the United States Post Office, which section is titled "Postmarking" which states: "Postmarks are described by number for code purposes and there can be; (a) Postmark showing full name of postoffice and full or abbreviated name of state; (b) same but including date of mailing; (c) samd but including date and hour of mailing; so it is easy to see that much specialty stamp work can be accomplished in identifying the various code number cancellations. By the above Post Office ruling the gode number, in the circle or between the bars, is coupled with the circular cancellation which has the name of postoffice and state, with possibly additional date and hour of mailing, and the collector here knowing the city name of the postoffice then has readily before him the code number so will know that this letter was actually mailed from a division of this city postoffice. Further investibation may reveal to him the actual division of the postoffice from which it was mailed.

With the writer's 1938 Presidential cancellation collection, he just collects the number "I" on the three, different type of "Hammer or Ellipse cancels" and the number "I" appearing within the circle or between the horizontal bars. On the single circle type he needs the  $\frac{1}{2}\phi$ ,  $4\frac{1}{2}\phi$ ,  $5\phi$ ,  $11\phi$ ,  $13\phi$ ,  $14\phi$ ,  $17\phi$ ,  $19\phi$ ,  $22\phi$ ,  $24\phi$ , \$1, \$2, and \$5. On the double circle he needs the  $\frac{1}{2}\phi$ ,  $1\frac{1}{2}\phi$ ,  $2\phi$ ,  $7\phi$ ,  $8\phi$ ,  $11\phi$ ,  $13\phi$ ,  $14\phi$ ,  $16\phi$ ,  $17\phi$ ,  $19\phi$ ,  $20\phi$ ,  $22\phi$ ,  $24\phi$ , \$1, \$2 and \$5. On the type with the horizontal bars he needs the  $4\frac{1}{2}\phi$ ,  $7\phi$ ,  $11\phi$ ,  $13\phi$ ,  $14\phi$ ,  $16\phi$ ,  $17\phi$ , \$1, \$2 and \$5.
