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STANDARIZED HAND STAMP CANCELLATIONS ON THE BANK NOTE ISSUES

Illustrations on page 6.

First I want to say that I have just found a cover with an early 3ϕ green, bearing cancel 107, which is from Waterbury, Conn. In addition, I have found a cancel very similar to illustration II6; it shows a "2" with a curved tail, the Worcester's is straight, and the numeral is on a striped instead of a solid centre. I shall illustrate them next time.

Type D - Letters
Illustrations 119-124

II9 is from Andover, Mass. Besides the "A", I have a "B", both on early 3ϕ , as well as a "D" and an "M" on 2ϕ vermilions. A whole set may possibly exist.

120 is a monogram composed on an "S" and a "T". It comes from Stoneham, Mass., and is on a 210.

The next three are all unknown as to origin. 121 and 123 are on 3ϕ greens, and 122 is on a 2ϕ vermilion. 124 is from Portland, Me., on a 210, and is of the same shape as illustrated in 111. 109 and 110. I have letters "A" and "B".

Illustrations 125-133

This section comprises fancy types other than those inspired by the Boston cancels.

125, 126 and 127 are striped. In the first the bars run horizontally, in the second they run from bottom right to top left, and in the latter from top right to bottom left. 125 is on a 210, 125 and 127 are on 2ϕ vermilions, and from type 126 I have a "K" on a 3ϕ green. All are of unknown origin.

128, on a 2ϕ vermilion, is also unknown. 129 on a 3ϕ green comes from Worcester, Mass.

130, 131 and 132 are all single items of unknown origin. The first and the latter are on 3ϕ greens, and the "K" on an early 1ϕ blue. 133 is one of the nicest cancels I have ever found. It is on a 3ϕ green, but is also unknown as to origin.

Next time I shall continue the same kind of cancellations.

20TH CENTURY CANCELS ARE FUN!

Inspired by his excellent beginning with the target, oval and hammer cancels, our collector wishing to enlarge his cancellation collection to cover other varieties now desires to secure one of the most coveted of the later cancels. the ever popular machine "Socked on the Nose" or "On the Nose" cancels on the single stamps of the series or set that he is collecting. This cancel is recognized and sought by nearly every collector, cancellation collector or otherwise, and its' desireability has caused such a great demand that dealers, from the largest to the smallest, price this particular cancel above all other later cancels, excepting possibly the color target, and the mint issue of the stamp canceled.

The machine "On the nose" cancel, when it appears on the stamp or envelope, is an attractive circle in which will appear the name of the city, state, date and time mailed and sometimes a station number on the first class mail and the third class mail only will allow the appearance of the city, state and sometimes a station number. The station number, sometimes appearing on the first or third class mail, would mean that it was mailed from a larger city where there are division stations in that city and the number itself would designate a division station of that city. Thus the actual historical evidence of postal usage right on the stamp itself makes this cancel a choice collector's item.

The machine "On the nose" cancels are obtained by the processing of great quantities of regular mail through the first and third class sections of the postoffice, of a limited weight and flat envelopes as any mail that is too bulky would have to be handstamped as it would be too bulky to be run through the machines. The "On the nose" cancel is only a part of the entire cancellation placed on these envelopes and while the "On the nose" part appears to the left the other part of the cancel and will be either a long flag, long advertisement, hammer or "Wiggle or Jail", wavy lines, cancel. Thus if the stamp is coarectly affixed to the upper right corner of the envelope, as requested by the postal instructions, the stamp would never receive the "On the nose" cancel as it would always be imprinted with part of the long, flag, or "Wiggle or Jail" cancel if it is a regular issue although sometimes the long commemoratives can catch a good part of these type of cancels. Therefore a number of enthusiastic collectors, certainly not to circumvent the law but to secure the more desired "On the nose" cancel, have experimentally placed the stamp a certain distance inward from the upper right corner on their mailing which has resulted in some well-centered, many off centered "On the nose" cancels appearing in stamp collector's collections and dealer's stocks.

Earlier an unique, ingenious "On the nose" philatelic accessory called the Peerless Pal has been developed and produced by the Peerless Album Company, Box 841, Aurora, Ill., which is a small card with a precision measured opening to place the stamp when mailing so even a beginner can obtain the desired "On the nose" cancel. The handy card also contains a perforation, millimeter gauge and small rule and has received a tremendous philatelic acceptance in the Philatelic Press besides being featured at Compex and various large State shows.

Authority for the "On the nose" cancel is given by Section 332 of the U.S. Post Office Department's "Postal Manual" as Section 332.46 and Section 332.462 give authority and directions to the large and small postoffices to adjust date and time on this postmark. Third class mail has city, state but not date or time.

The writer, with his 1938 Presidential cancellation collection, like all other collectors admires and covetes this type of cancel for his private collection and needs the 14¢, 16¢, 17¢, 19¢, 21¢, 22¢, 24¢, 30¢, \$1, \$2, and \$5 having all others. Of the "Wiggle or Jail" cancel, which are quite common, he needs the $4\frac{1}{2}¢$, 6¢, 9¢. 11¢, 12¢, 13¢, 14¢, 16¢, 17¢, 19¢, 21¢, 22¢, 25¢. 50¢, \$1, \$2, and \$5.


Therefore, the addition of the forever sought and wanted "On the nose" cancels will provide an attractive and colorful array to any collector's collection. To discover the "First day", date of issue, rare "On the nose" cancels or the fine "True date", year of issue, "On the nose" cancels is a reward of great satisfaction as well as value for the individual collector but just the possession of any "On the nose" cancels offers boundless enjoyment to every collector.
