

THE COURT OF HONOR

The Court of Honor at the 46th Annual Exhibition and bourse of the Michigan Stamp Club featured material from the Ann Arbor Postal History Collection formed by Robert H. Schoen (#384). A Gold Medal was won by Robert Pritchard (\$454) and a Bronze one by Augustus Hendelman (#296).

At the Peoria Philatelic Society 1960 Exhibition J. Stanley Thompson (#439) received a "Best in Section" Award for his Civil War Patriotics. Barbara R. Mueller (#360) a first place award for her "U.S. Orphan Bank Notes" and a third for her "Colombia & States". Edwin Puls (#60) a second for his "Early U. S. Machine Cancellations and Robert Pritchard (#454) a second for "What is a Perfin?"

Edward L. Willard (#125) was among the American exhibitors who won awards at the recent International Philatelic Congress held in Barcelona, Spain. The Philatelic Press has been enthusiastic in its accounts of this Congress.

Robert H. Miller (#393) reports that he has exhibited his NYFM collection in several shows recently and has won either a first or second in each of them.

James H. Wilson, Solon. Iowa was awarded the USCC Certificate for his exhibit of Pictorial Cancels and Postmarks on USA #210 at the Tenth Annual Convention of the Federation of Iowa Stamp Clubs held recently at Council Bluffs.

MORE ON PROVIDENCE by Wm. P. Barlow (#381).

With regard to the 19th Century Postal Markings used from Providence shown on the March, 1960, "News", there are three other flag cancels which are not shown.

First, a cancel similar to PC289 used in the year 1899, the difference being large year date, i.e., 1899. This is considered to be a separate variety by flag collectors.

Two other flag cancellations were used -- one each at Station A and Station B during the year 1899. These were of the type shown in Langford's Flag Cancel Encyclopedia as B 38.

INDIAN TERRITORY KILLERS 1868-1907 by GASPARE SIGNORELLI

Illustrations on Pages 27-30

Like most of the Postmasters throughout the country during the 19th and early 20th centuries, those in the Indian Territory contributed their share of cork, fancy wheel, device and machine cancellations to our nation's postal history. The killers shown on pages 27-30 represent the large majority of those used on mail from the territory but should not be considered complete since new material is being turned up regularly. It is interesting to note that, when Indian Territory became the State of Oklahoma (Nov. 16, 1907) only eight post offices were using the popular cancel of that day, the flag cancellation.

NOTE: Whenever numerals appear in the killers they are listed in parentheses after the type killer.






