




LONG BEACH STAMP COLLECTORS' CLUB



TERRITORIAL COVER COLLECTING

When collectors say "Cancellations", we seldom are referring solely to the obliterations that render stamps unfit for reuse in franking mail. Rather, we generally mean "Postal markings," which are all of the notations officially applied to a piece of mail as it passes through postal channels. Cover collectors are particularly given to using the word in this broader sense.

Everything else being equal, a stampless cover is likely to carry more markings because notations were used in place of a stamp. Accordingly there is likely to be more postal history to be deciphered from the markings on a stampless cover. It is this aspect of cover collecting that attracts many an enthusiast to some particular field of stampless.

Territorial covers are those used in a United States Territory prior to its admission to the Union as a full-fledged state. From most territories these are not plentiful, since a territory typically was created by Congress in a sparsely settled wilderness. When this area was granted statehood a few years later, this generally occurred before the region contained sufficient population to produce any great volume of mail. Some territories which became states in the first two decades of the 1800's produced so few covers that those which have been found are truly museum pieces.

One of several territories that yielded enough covers to be rewarding, and few enough to be interesting to collectors, is Wisconsin. In the strict sense its postal history began when Wisconsin Territory was formed from Michigan Territory on July 4th, 1836 and ended 12 years later when the State of Wisconsin was admitted to the Union on May 29, 1848.

Any such legalistic definition would rule out many of the most interesting and significant items available to the Wisconsin Territory Collector and Postal Historian. Mail moved with reasonable regularity in this region more than 300 years ago, long before the first Post Office was established on Dec. 6, 1821 at Green Bay, then in Michigan Territory and the last Wisconsin Territory Town Mark was not discarded by many a Post Office in the original 280,000 square miles of the original Wisconsin Territory of 1836 until years after these offices were in other political jurisdictions.

Modern man with his ideas geared to the speed and ease with which he and his mail move across continents and oceans in the second half of the 20th Century finds it hard to believe there ever was any considerable traffic or mail service on the Great Lakes and the rivers of the middle West before these regions were settled

150 years ago or less. The fact is by the year 1700 the French Explorers and Missionaries had paddled their birch bark craft across all of the region North of the Ohio River. They traveled by canoe, they shipped furs and maple sugar eastward, trade goods and supplies westward, in Mackinaw boats 50 feet long and 10 feet wide propelled by the paddles of a dozen squat swarthy halfbreeds who could work from daybreak to dark on a diet of lard and parched corn.

Editor's note: This article was prepared for the special issue of LINN'S but, because of mechanical difficulties, was not used. We believe it to be of sufficient interest to start in this issue of the NEWS and to continue in later issues until finished.


AUCTIONS COMING
