



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U.S. PORT POSTMASTERS AND THEIR 'PAQUEBOT' CANCELLATIONS

A salty tang is the free bonus awaiting collectors of "paquebot" cancellations -- one of the least common types of United States cancel-The postmaster in almost every U. S. lations. port city has been issued such a "paquebot" can-But the usage is infrequent. Only cellation. when ship's officers or ship's agents bring mail to the port post office, personally, and assure the postal official that the mail was actually written on board a foreign ship, while the vessel was on the high seas, will the postmaster apply his special "paquebot" cancellation.

The stamps used on "paquebot" mail must match the nationality of the ship. Mail from a Dutch ship, posted in Norfolk, must have the proper rate of Dutch postage. Thus we have foreign stamps cancelled, and quite legitimately, in a United States post office (U.S. ship's mail with U. S. postage is cancelled in foreign countries when U. S. vessels call at overseas posts,

but that is quite another story)

The purpose of the paquebot cancellation is two fold--first to explain why stamps of another nation are accepted at a U. S. post office with-out question or assessment of postage due, and secondly to explain the delay between the date the letter is written and the date in the post-

This unusual arrangement derives from an international agreement between all major sea-The French word "paquebot" was faring nations. officially adopted for use on ships mail by the Universal Postal Union Congress held in Washington, D.C. in 1897, although "paquebot" cancellations had been used in Great Britain from 1894. In the United States, "paquebot" cancellations In the United States, date from 1895, when port postmasters in New York City and San Francisco began to use straight-line "paquebot" cancellations. Boston followed suit in 1898. Needless to say, examples of the early Subsequently, usages are now uncommon. postmasters in thirty-seven other ports in the United States and United States possessions (excluding the Philippines) introduced "paquebot" cancellations for mail from foreign ships. Two of the most recent instances where post postmasters introduced "paquebot" cancellations are Savannah. Georgia where the straight-line "paquebot" cancellation was first used on July 23, 1960, and at Wilmington, North Carolina where the earliest date of recorded usage is April 17, 1961. Not all U.S. postmasters can be considered fluent in French, and many variations of the word "paquebot" can be found. New Orleans has used a mark with the spelling as PAGUEBOT. Corpus Christi uses a PAQUEDOT spelling, and Wilmington spells the word PARQUEBOT.

Paquebot cancellations are conveniently divided into two types --- Straight-line cancellations without a port name are called Type A, and cancellations which include the town name are called Type B. Illustrated on Front Page are five Type A and three Type B "paguebot" cancellations. All of these cancellations are currently in use at the particular United States port for which they are listed. While the Type B cancellation, often in the round style to which we have been accustomed. is readily identified and more striking; the straight-line A types afford more of a field for research.

Type A paquebot cancellations are recorded

CRISTOBAL Most of these forty ports still use a "paquebot" cancellation for mail which they receive from foreign ships. It will be noted that some ports use both Type A and Type B cancellations at one time or another over the 66 years that "paquebot" cancellations have been in use The collecting picture is furin this country. ther complicated or made more interesting, depending upon the collector's particular viewpoint, by the fact that some ports, such as Boston, have used as many as nine different styles of "paque-bot" cancellations. The "paquebot" mark is often used to cancel the foreign stamps, but on other occasions the regular U. S. cancellation is used on the foreign stamps, and the "paquebot" mark is used as a supplementary postal marking. Under either circumstance, they are official, and they are applied in the U.S. post office. The Post Office Department regulations have this to say about the use of "paquebot" cancellations:

Mail posted aboard ships on the high seas must bear postage stamps of the country whose flag the vessel flies. On arrival at a port, an officer of the ship hands the mail into the post office of the port city, where the stamps are cancelled and the mail is dispatched. If the stamps are foreign, the post office uses a special "Paquebot" postmark or applies the word "Paquebot" to the envelope in ink or with a rubber stamp.

The foregoing is a direct quotation of Section 111.2(c) of Subchapter L -- Postal Union Mail of

the Post Office Department Regulations.

Mail with "Paquebot" cancellations orginates mainly with passengers on cruise liners. sometimes from crewmen on freighters, and sometimes through the courtesy of ship's officers who respond to the request of a collector who cancellations with a salty tangprefers U.S. the "paquebot" cancellations.


