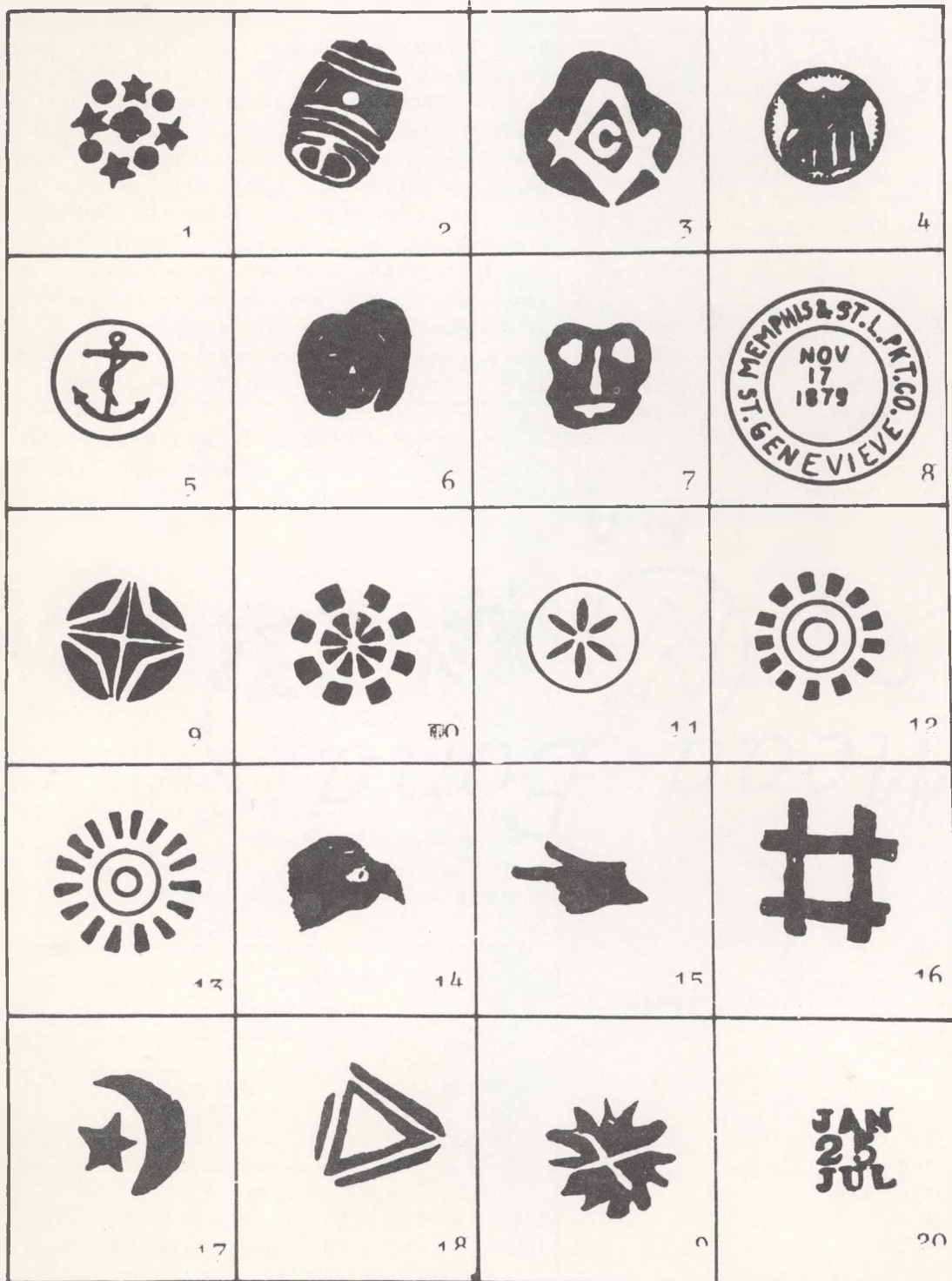

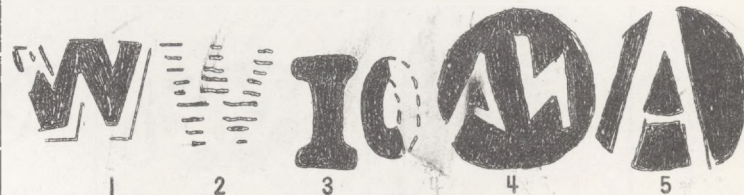
LIBRARY

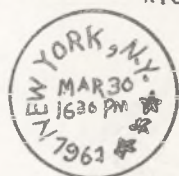

THE LEAVITT MACHINE CANCELLATIONS

(Footnote to a Postscript)

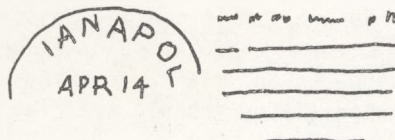

Even before my last group of amendments to the Leavitt record had been published (USCC News, Jan. 1962), two new items of extreme interest appeared which now require a footnote to the postscript.

The first of these is a

hitherto unreported member of Group A, from New York. I have shown earlier that for a short period before the introduction of the First Group B cancel (New York, Mar. 26, 1878) a hybrid cancel was used there, involving a straight-line postmark and a barred-oval killer (Type AB-NY, Mar. 2-25). This apparently represented some sort of preparatory run, either of the original Leavitt machine (used in New York in 1876) or of the new machine before the new cancelling dies could be supplied. The new item pushes the record back to Feb. 21, 1878, and must be evidence of an even earlier experimental run. The postmark is the same straight-line die as was used in AB-NY, with the wide spacing between NEW and YORK. The killer, however, is a rectangular arrangement of 7 horizontal bars. I have classified this cancel as Type A4-NY; see Fig. 26. It is on postal card S4; the impression is very clear and lies entirely on the card. The very undistinguished appearance of the killer is in itself evidence that it was used only as a makeshift until the barred-oval die could be delivered.

I feel strongly that there is a relationship between this cancel and the one I have called C-2 Wash. (See fig. 25, USCC News, Nov. 1960). In the latter the top bar is so blurred in all copies I have seen that I have described the cancel as having six bars, but I now am inclined to believe that it is properly a 7-bar die, and may even be the same die as was used in A4-NY. Its temporary use is another point of similarity.

The second new item to be reported here ties in with the above discussion in that it is beyond doubt another use of the C-2 Wash. killer die, this time from Indianapolis, and dated Apr. 14, 1886. It is used with a normal Group B postmark. The lower bars are faint or missing, but the top bar is blurred and agrees in detail with the Washington example; no tracing can show the close correspondence. (Type C-Ind., Fig. 27.) I am now

even more inclined to believe that this die was used as a sort of universal substitute during emergencies; if I am right, it may turn up sooner or later from still other cities that had Leavitt machines.

One final(?) note: I have seen two copies of a Boston Group A cancel in which only the postmark shows, centered squarely on the stamp. Both are from Feb., 1876. Whether these resulted from faulty operation of the machine (which seems quite possible), or were produced intentionally, is not clear. If the latter, they should be classified as a new variety, if not a new type. However, Floyd (Billig's Philatelic Handbook, Vol. 12) shows a cancel so far displaced to the right that only BOS/MA/JAN. 16 P shows on the card. This suggests strongly that the machine was at fault. If any readers have similar examples, I would like to hear of them.

U. S. CANCELLATION CLUB EXHIBIT IN NOVEMBER

In addition, all exhibits in the section will be in competition for the show's Grand Award.

A prospectus for the show and application to exhibit are included with this issue of the NEWS. We suggest that those of you who are interested in exhibiting in this year's show send in their application and check as soon as possible, since last year's SEPAD show was sold out by September.

You are all invited to attend the show in Philadelphia on November 2, 3, and 4. The entire Roof Garden of the Adelphia Hotel will be used for the exhibit. 280 frames, each holding 12 pages up to 9" x 12" will be available for the show. There will be a bourse of 16 dealers.

Meeting rooms are available for the various groups, and special programs are being arranged for those USCC members who can attend. Further details will appear in the next issue of the NEWS.

An unusual feature of the banquet on Saturday evening will be the elimination of a guest speaker. The time usually allotted for the speaker will be used to present all awards for the show, and thus publicly commend the work of those collectors whose exhibits have merited awards.

Again - frames are limited, so send in your application and check now, and plan to meet your fellow members of the U. S. Cancellation Club at Philadelphia on November 2, 3, and 4.

INDIAN TERRITORY KILLERS

Since the Indian Territory killers and post office listings was printed in the May, July and September 1960 issues of the "NEWS" the following group turned up on covers from the territory.

During the past few years many collectors have differed as to the number of Indian Territory post offices that used the American Flag machine cancellation prior to statehood. Since the 1960 article appeared we conducted a survey with the result that only seven (not eight as previously mentioned) post offices used the American Flag machine cancellation. We learned that Durant, listed under "CHOCTAW NATION" did not use that popular cancel prior to statehood. Mr. William P. Barlow (USCC #381) who is a flag cancellation specialist, has done a considerable amount of research and states that his findings shows that only seven Indian Territory post offices used the American Flag Machine cancel.
