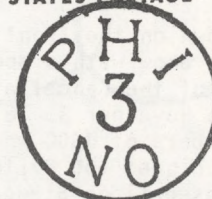

During the Exhibition many of the members in the Philadelphia area stopped at the USCC table to get acquainted and chat. On Saturday afternoon a slide program was presented featuring the Fancy Cancels on the 3¢ 1861 issue supplied by Burleigh Jscobs (#160).

At the banquet on Saturday night, since no officer of USCC was present, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Stets (#482) represented the Club at the head table.

Shown on the front page is a cacheted cover from the show with a special souvenir cancel, a replica of the Cancellation used at Philadelphia (PHI) on November 3, 1812 (NO 3).

Members of USCC who exhibited in other sections included Bob Pritchard (#454) in Topicals with "Baseball on Stamps" and Dan Stone (#53) in Specialties with "Album Weeds".

NEW DISCOVERIES



This Cancellation was sent in by Arthur VanVlissingen (#49). It is a hitherto unknown New York Foreign Mail which Mr. VanVlissingen has tentatively designated #95A since part of it resembles #95. The cover is from the Pearson Correspondence to Lima, Peru and was mailed at New York on March 22, 1873 franked with a 10¢ & a 12¢ National each tied with an individual strike of the cancel. Many thanks to Mr. VanVlissingen and to Mr. Ray VanHandel Sr. of Sheboygan who made the accurate drawing.



This Postmark & Cancellation is in magenta on a very neat cover typing a 3¢ Green. It was sent in by Mr. Donald F. Garrett (#481).



This Cancel was illustrated on the front page of the January, 1959 issue sent in by Dr. deWasserman (#418) who stated it was used at Waseca, state name illegible. James R. Littleton (#363) to whom the Cancellation was familiar although he had never known the origin, has checked and found the only "Waseca" listed in the USA to be in Minnesota, so we may assume the cancel to hail from Waseca, Minn.

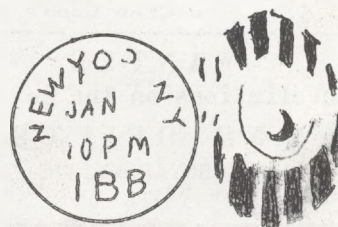

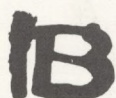

NEED SOME GOOD CANCELLATIONS?

Here's a good way to get them: Dig those duplicates and other items out of your stock book and the file drawer where they have been roosting for months or years. Write Charlie Root for some circuit books and envelopes for covers, then price and mount this material you have no use for and send it in to him for sale through the USCC circuits.

"Yeh, but how is that going to get me any more stamps for my collection?" Well, that's a fair question and easy to answer. First, with more and better material arriving in the USCC circuits, other members are going to stir off their comfortable, well-upholstered posteriors to enter more and better cancellations and covers of their own for you to buy.

Aw, please. I've already got my duplicates spread out on the table ready to mount, so you can buy them. Gimme a chance at yours.

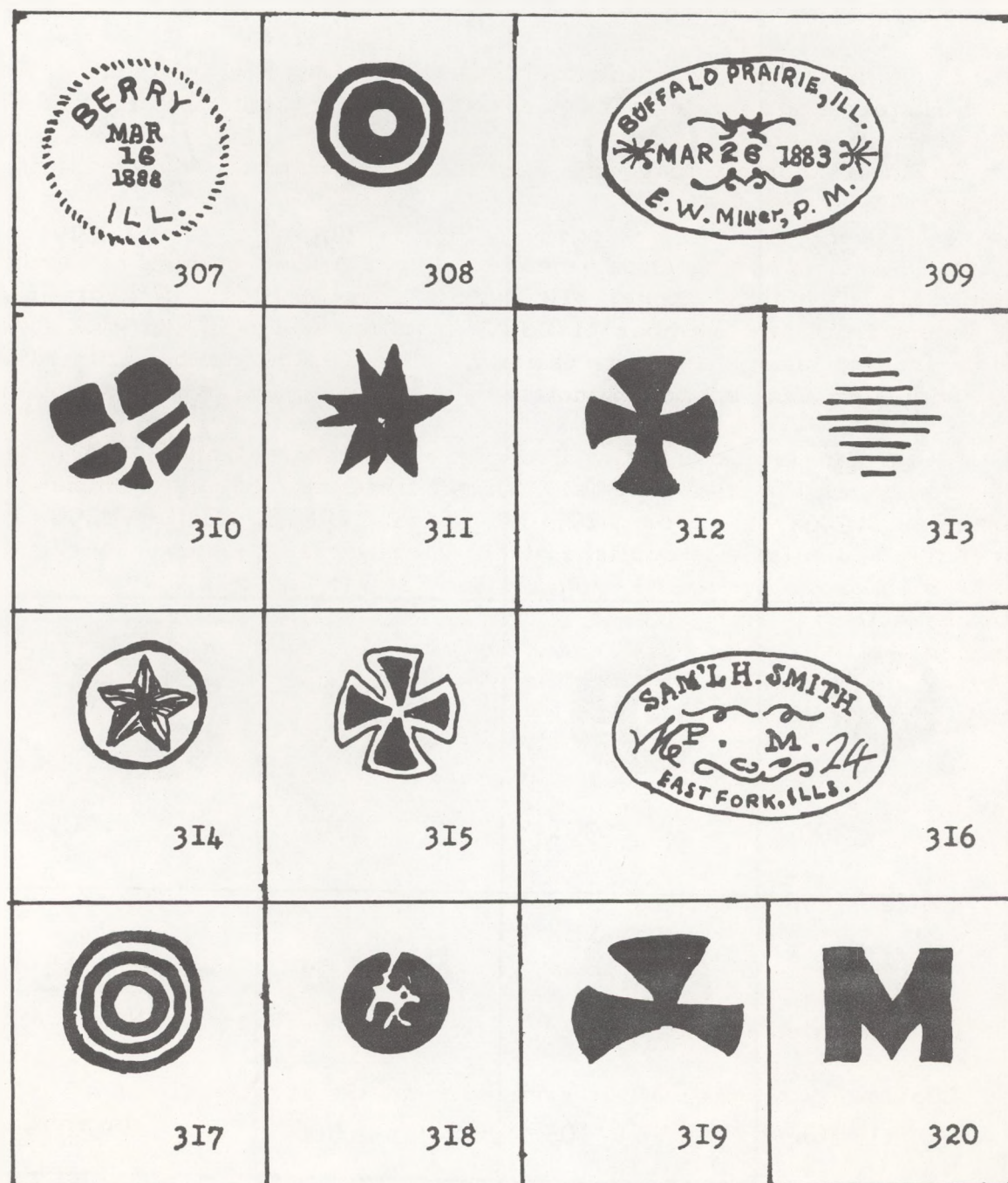
BACK #s NEWS & QUARTERLY

BENEFITS OF MEMBERSHIP

The U S CANCELLATION CLUB has been, for a number of years, the leading Society devoted entirely to the field of Postal Markings and Cancellations. Serving the interests of beginners as well as of advanced specialists it is a non-profit organization operated for the benefit of its members.

The following Club functions are of special help to the collector:

1. A Sales Department through which stamps and covers may be bought and sold, thereby furnishing a source of supply to the members, an outlet for their duplicates and helping to establish a true market value. (See back page.)
2. A Research Department constantly seeking new information regarding Postal History and Markings and preparing it for presentation through the Club's Publication.
3. A Bi-monthly magazine sent free to members. Subscription price to others \$2.00 per year.
4. An Expertizing Department to give qualified opinion on doubtful items. Mr. Daniel A. Stone, 310 Denver Theatre Bldg., Denver 2, Colo. will accept from any member of USCC a stamp or cover and will give an opinion free of charge as to its validity. The item should be mounted on a sheet with sufficient space for notations. Return postage must be included.
5. A Library, consisting, as this is written, of about 150 items available to members on a loan basis. This is under the direction of the Club's Librarian, Mr. Wm. J. Bomar, 1846 153rd Ave. SE, Bellevue, Wash. The list of items available is published from time to time and may be secured from Mr. Bomar or the Secretary. The latest list was made in July, 1962 with additions noted in later editions of the NEWS. Shipping weight of each item is shown in the list. Members requesting loan of items from the Library must be sure to enclose sufficient postage with their request. Members pay transportation both ways.

Membership in USCC is granted through application passed upon by a Membership Committee. Dues are \$3.00 per year payable in advance. The year starts on Jan. 1. New members pay as follows:

Those accepted between Jan.	1	and April 30	\$3.00

No admission fee is charged.

THE SALES DEPARTMENT

The Sales Department of USCC is operated much the same as are those of other philatelic organizations.

We operate five different types of circuits:

1. 19th Century off cover only
2. 19th Century Covers
3. 20th Century off cover only
4. 20th Century Covers
5. Special Selections

Circuits consist of about 12 books of stamps or of about 20 of covers. Circuit groups are made up of from 6 to 15 members and are arranged geographically to reduce cost of transportation to a minimum. Each circuit is accompanied by a letter giving full instructions for handling and a list of members to whom it is to be sent as well as a list of the books of stamps or covers included. Each member, in turn, inspects it as promptly as possible, taking those items he wishes and signing for them in the space provided. He then fills out a report blank and mails it along with remittance for material taken to the sales manager, (The Dept. is run on a cash basis), and forwards the circuit to the next member on the list, using either express or parcel post. On the regular circuits members pay transportation to the next on the list only. On special selections members pay transportation both ways, from the sales manager to them and back again. Members must make a special effort to handle circuits promptly. This should never take more than ten days and should usually be accomplished much sooner than that.

Members wishing to sell material through the Department may get from the sales manager, sales books for 120 stamps @ 10¢ each, cover envelopes for up to 20 covers @ 5 for 25¢ or cover books with 12 separate containers, to give better protection to valuable items, for 20¢ each. All are specially prepared and have printed instructions, as well as space for describing the contents. Any stamp or cover which has passed through the mails may be entered. All items must be priced net and wherever possible the information and the description should serve to identify the item positively. Each book or sales envelope received by the Department will be assigned a number and the owner will be notified. All material in the sales department stock is fully covered by insurance while in the possession of any member or in transit between members. This applies wherever the member may live and it is not necessary to insure parcels post shipments after the material has once been entered in the stock.

In addition to the cost of the sales books and envelopes the Sales Department charges are as follows: 1-1/2% of original retail value for insurance (minimum charge on each sales book or envelope 25¢) and 15% of actual sales made for the Sales Manager's commission (Minimum charge for this too on each sales book or envelope 25¢). These two charges along with cost of returning remainders to owner will be deducted at the time of retirement. Sales books and Envelopes will be retired and settlement made when they have been all around or when they are too far depleted to send out again. The length of time required will vary somewhat depending on saleability of material and promptness of members in forwarding circuits. We try not to keep any sales book or envelope over 18 months but some do run over this.
