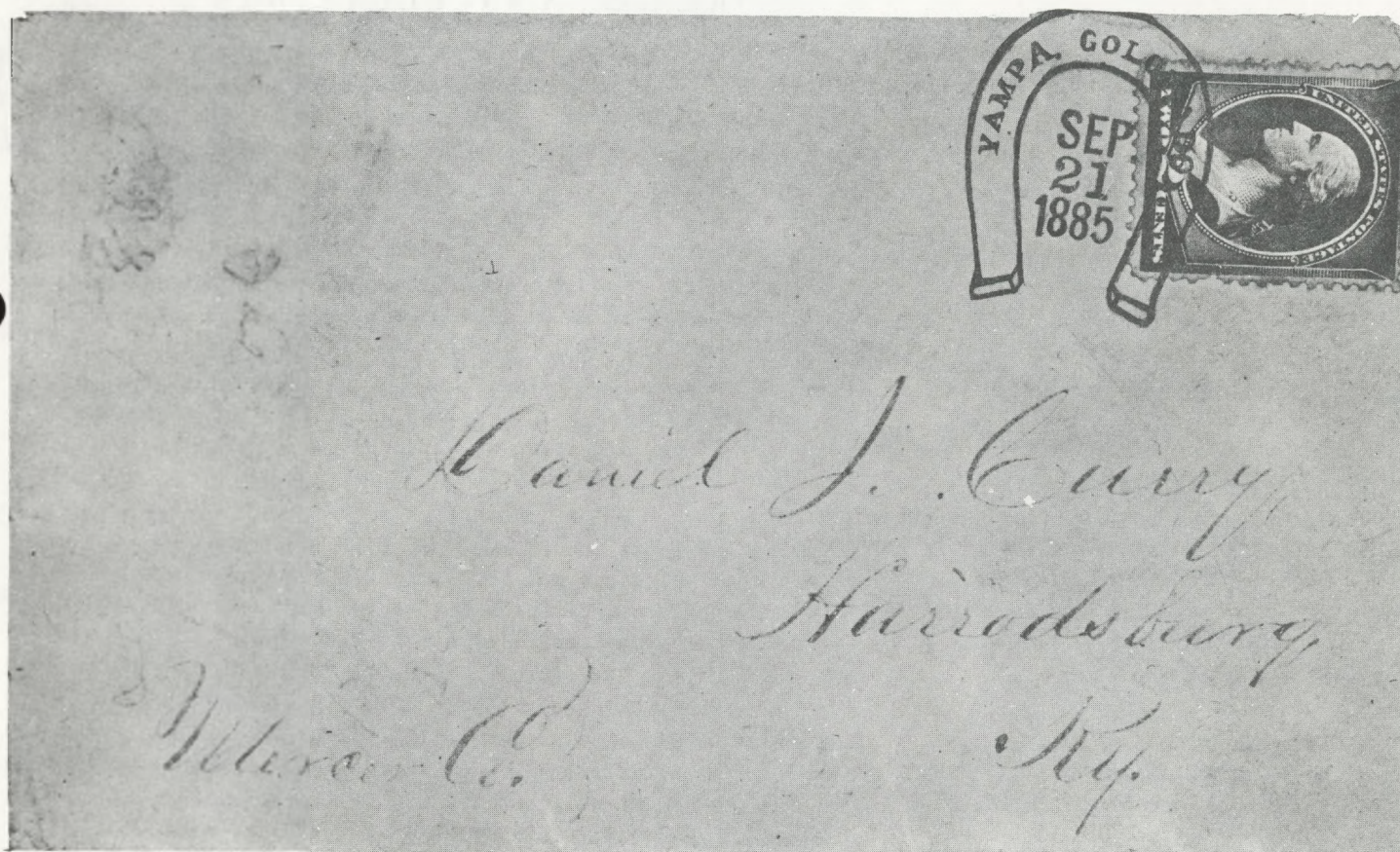

QUAKER DATED POSTMARKS

In the NEWS for January several of Mr. Johnson's Cancels were marked with an asterisk designating that the postmarks were "Quaker Dated".

We know now that at least some members read the NEWS since we have had discussions on "Quaker Dated" from them. All question the possibility of "Quaker Dated" Postmarks having been used in Chicago. Also they explain that the Quakers, feeling that the names of the months were derived from pagan Gods or from other heathen sources, refused to use those names and instead numbered the months, 1st, 2nd etc. Oddly enough, according to Mr. Richard Russell (#444) Dr. Carroll Chase was in error in assuming that the Quakers' 1st month corresponded to January. Actually their 1st is the one we know as March, 2nd April etc.

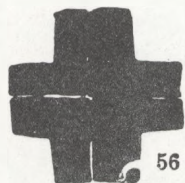

HANDBOOK OF TERRITORIAL POSTAL HISTORY

Veterans, as well as newcomers studying the postal service of Early and Mid-19th Century will discover in The Territorial Post Offices of Wisconsin much information never before in print. This volume of 38 pages has just now been published by the Wisconsin Postal History Society.

It is profusely illustrated with original maps, reproductions of actual covers, and dozens of handstamps and manuscript postmarks, accurately traced by Ray Van Handel, Sr. His co-authors are Harold E. Richow and Arthur Van Vlissingen.

The book contains authoritative factual material more complete than that previously compiled on the post offices, the postal markings, and the covers of Wisconsin Territory. By permission, it utilizes all of the pertinent data from the Chase-Cabeen handbook and other pioneer territorial postal history researches.

Included in a historical sketch covering the postal service from crude beginnings before 1700, to Wisconsin's admission as a state in 1848. Still more valuable to the student of postal history are extensive brass-tacks facts contained in this book's maps and tables of research data. Every post office ever in Wisconsin Territory is listed, beginning with Green Bay, Michigan Territory, established in 1821. This roll lists many post offices subsequently in Iowa and Minnesota. Also each post Office is shown on maps of the periods during which it operated.

Most unusual feature of this volume is a listing and detailed description of the postmarks, rate markings, and the dates of more than 1350 individual covers of Wisconsin Territory.

From this list, each cover can always be identified. Careful compilers tallied all covers that could be found in hands of dealers and known collectors. Because this listing clearly shows the relative scarcities of covers and postal markings from all known offices, these statistics will be particularly useful to collector and dealer as a guide to valuations.

For some time we have been enjoying an exchange arrangement with the Editor of THE BUREAU SPECIALIST. In it we have been reading articles by members of USCC. Barbara Mueller (#360) seems to have a worthwhile one in each issue. The February issue is no exception. She writes on "Collection Presentation". Also in that issue are two articles by Robert Markovits (#641) one on United States Philatelic Literature and the other on The Numbers Game.

Washington, D.C., January 23, 1964.--An exhibit of rare stamps and postal items of historical interest is on display in a temporary exhibit hall of the Smithsonian Institution's new Museum of History and Technology when that building is opened to the public on January 23. Some of the philatelic items are shown for the first time since being acquired for the National Postage Stamp Collection. The temporary exhibit will be continued until the Hall of Philately and Postal History is completed at a later date.

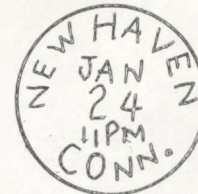
The exhibit includes the famous U.S. 24-cent airmail stamp of 1918 and the Canadian St. Lawrence Seaway commemorative stamp of 1959 with inverted centers. Other exhibited stamps with inverted vignettes are the U.S. bi-colored issues of 1869 and 1901. The same case also contains a "Mulready" 1-penny envelope of Great Britain postmarked on the first day of use, May 6, 1840; an envelope addressed by Henry Clay bearing the scarce "Uncle Sam" river packet marking of about 1846; the "Lady McLeod" stamp of 1847 on cover; and an imperforate U.S. 2-cent sheet with the 5-cent errors occurring on the issue of 1916-17.

Another case exhibits rare and unusual items from the Smithsonian's postal history collection. The original manuscript record of Dead Letter Mail of the United States for the year 1777-88; a pocket-size postage stamp carrying case of 1890, created and marketed by Lewis Carroll, author of Alice in Wonderland; and a postcard recovered from the wreckage of the German airship "Hindenburg," which burned at Lakehurst, N.J., in 1937, are among the items shown.
