

Collecting Topical Slogan Cancellations is a branch of philately that is popular with many persons who otherwise would not be interested in postmarks and cancels. Here is a form of collecting with very few "do's and don'ts". You pick a topic or theme that appeals to your own interest, gather slogan cancels from the nations of the world whose designs and wording are related to your topic, and display and mount them in whatever manner suits you best.

> Recent events receiving worldwide recognition were Rotary International's 50th Anniversary. World Refugee Year, World Mental Health Year, and Shakespeare's 400th Anniversary, to name a few. The United Nations and the Olympic Games are regularly topics of international releases.

Topical slogan cancel collections are usually displayed on blank album pages. Most of the fun of topical slogan collecting is making attractive arrangements on pages. Most topics can be divided into groups and the slogans of each group mounted together.

If you collect animals, you can have one group for domestic animals, another for wild animals. Within each group, you can have a separate page for each animal.

A collector of sports would divide his collection into groups for baseball, football, skiing, swimming, etc. Similar divisions suggest themselves for practically all other topics.

Learn as much as you can about your topic and write a little caption below each item in your album. Your write - up should tell briefly and precisely the story behind the slogan cancel as related to your particular subject.

Various catalogs will give you information about the slogans. To learn the historical background of your field, you will have to consult an encyclopedia and other such reference books.

Slogan cancels often fit into more than one kind of topical collection due to combined designs or descriptions, such as the U.S. Stamp Centenary slogan containing an eagle.

The choice of a topic for a specialized collection is practically unlimited - topics such as outer space were not even thought of a few years ago! Now there are many slogan cancels describing or illustrating space capsules, satellites, astronauts - no doubt there are many more to come.
