



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#### "LETTER IN WREATH" By Robert H. Schoen

Interest in the fancy cancellations on the banknote issues has grown year after year. and what was once considered commonplace, now is freely illustrated in auction catalouges, and prices of course, have been advancing as others join in the quest of these items. Cancellations on cover are not as common as collectors and dealers thought, and some examples are just not available, but have been "locked" in albums for many years.

The "Letter in Wreath" or "Letter in Leaves" cancellations appear to originate from the small postoffices in the greater Philadelphia area, but there is no reference to them in philatelic articles. Fritz Billig illustrates one in his handbooks, and Delf Norona Illustrates one in his postal marking catalouge, but nothing more.

A complete examination of the advertisements in the P.L.&R. Guides show that J. Goldsborough, 720 Chestnut St., Philadelphia, Penna. was a manufacturer of "stamps" for Postmasters and others, and that he was in business in 1875. (typical advertisement --- page 27 Postal Guide) Each Guide contained one of his advertisements, until they were replaced by an advertisement of Eagle Stamp Manufacturing Co., P. O. Box 583, Philadelphia, Penna, -- Successors to J. Goldsborough. (Eagle advertisement--Postal Guide page 28--1885)

A letter to Mr. Delf Norona of Moundsville, W. Va. brought this reply: "I gave up philately some 15 years and sold everything except Gov't postal literature--Guides, P.L.&R., and the like."

"However, when I retired three years ago I started collecting again but along different lines. Don't recall whether I had the "E" in leaves illustrated in my catalouge of U.S. Postmarks or not, but just recall having seen such cancels, but no definite recollection."

"Am familiar with the Goldsborough ads in the Guides which you say you have. The only way of course, to <u>prove</u> Goldsborough made the particular item is to find an advertisement of Goldsborough with the illustration."

"The fact too, that this type of cancel is turning up in the Philadelphia area indicates that it was made in Philadelphia. The period too, of the known uses, if used before 1886 would tend also to indicate they were made in the Goldsborough era.

There is no definite proof that Goldsborough created the "Letter in Wreath" canceller, and there probably won't be until such time a Goldsborough catalouge is found. The situation could be similar to the "Kicking Mule" canceller as definite proof of the origin of that cancellation was lacking until a complete catalouge of Red Rubber Stamps, published by C. A. Klinker & Co., of San Francisco, was offered at auction during the APS convention at San Francisco in 1954.

Whether we credit Goldsborough or not, with the canceller, it is definite that the "wreath" or "leaves" are constant, but the "letters" vary in size and font, and the majority are found used from small towns in the Philadelphia area.


