

On the front page we show a cover from the Ohio Postal History Collection belonging to Mr. Richard H. Schwinn (#658). This Post Office is located in Lawrence County, Ohio and was established by Robert C. Brammer August 4, 1855, discontinued June 30, 1857. reestablished Sept. 1, 1857. again discontinued August 8, 1860, again reestablished May 16, 1871. As recently as two years ago the Postmaster was Clark Brammer.

PROVIDENCE POSTMARK

The Providence Postmark sent in by Catherine Kendall (#465) and illustrated on page 78 of the September NEWS brought comments from two members, Edwin H. Cole (#602) and Moe Luff (#252). Mr. Cole's was in the form of a letter to Mrs. Kendall, copy of which was sent to your editor. We quote from it. Mr. Luff sent his comments to your editor. We quote from them. Illustration #1 on page 87 came from Mr. Cole. He sent also an illustration of the "TURNKEY POST OFFICE" but we use the one from Mr. Luff since it shows the cancellation more completely. This is #2 on page 87. Mr. Cole's letter follows:

The Providence, R.L., cancellation illustrated on p.78 of the Sept. 1965, issue of U.S.C.C. News was made by what is generally referred to as a "converted Pitney-Bowes metermachine", The particular machine (there may be more than one) which uses this style of cancellation is located at the "Turnkey Post Office", which opened.officially, on 10/20/60. although I have seen mail cancelled from this office as early as 10/13/60. This office, touted to be the first fully automatic post office, is far from being such, as you have probably read in the press. The six (6) Intelex facer-cancelers(not eleven, as sometimes reported) were not even in use on 10/20/60 and were not placed in operation until 11/30/60. These rapid cancelers are not able to handle the mail, and Universal machines have been used and even some have been added since the office opened. and the Pitney-Bowes meters have been used, too, as I note above; <u>and</u>. they still bring in mail from all the rest of the Sectional Center, which includes Bristol Co., Mass., for cancellation under the CAP system. (I have examples of Intelex cancels from Pawtucket - all mail received at Pawtucket after 3:30 PM is taken to Providence and cancelled with a Pawtucket Intelex die until about 10:30 PM; Cranston, Woonsocket, Hamden, Conn..etc.) ! forgot to mention that the Pitney-Bowes machines are a manually operated type, or at least were. There is an article covering most of the above in the May, 1963. issue of Scott's Monthly Stamp Journal, by Barbara Mueller, but her copy was badly mauled by the editor of the Journal and there are many mistakes in the article as published, as Barbara has written me,

I enclose reproductions of two examples like you illustrate. You will note that the 1960 cancel has the words Turnkey Post Office in it and the cancellation is rather short. The 1962 cancel is similar to your's, but is at least 99 mm. long and then runs off the edge of the cover. I have other examples which have wavy lines even longer than this.

You are correct in saying that these cancels are not too common. I am sure that you could have some covers serviced by the Postmaster if you send him some and state that you want them cancelled by the Pitney-Bowes Regular Manually Operated Canceler.

My interests are U.S. postal markings of all kinds.mostly modern. I have speciallized in the Pitney-Bowes Mark II. Van Marle #2. Reed "Fast Mac"AMF and Intelex facer-cancelers. Also have some sort of a collection of sortermarks, like the Bell, Transorma, Burroughs, etc. All these date from only 1955 on. Since I am interested Next column, please. mainly in modern cancellations. I use the terms postmark circle for the round part, and cancellation for the "killer", and I have written the above descriptions using these terms.

From Mr. Luff's remarks: "This is a P.B. Printer & Counter and has been in use at Providence for about five years or so, I think it was installed at the automated post office in 1960. It was used with the slogan, "TURNKEY POST OFFICE" from Dec. 14, 1960 to Dec. 31, 1960. This is a converted METER formerly used on the model A meter machines (also as a printer & counter) and was used for imprinting the bulk mail. There are three other machines of this type that have been and may still be in use, House of Assembly. Toronto, Ont. Canada, Federal Reserve Station. Kansas City. Mo. The third ! shall inform you about later.

OTHER ILLUSTRATIONS ON PAGE 87

[llustrations #s 3 & 4 were sent in by Mr. Wylie H, Flack (#603) He wishes to learn the origins of both of them. Both are on Centennial Env. Cut-Squares, #3 on Scott's #U219 & #4 on Scott's #221. These are dim but we hope you can make them out.

#5 was submitted by Wm. M. Able (#324).Size is 49x24mm. color.indigo. stamp 2ϕ Vermilion and 3ϕ Green Env. U163. Cover posted to Paris, France via Great Britain. Apparently then sent to the Posts & Telegraphs Station at the International Exposition in Paris in 1878. Presumably it was then re-directed and forwarded to Zurich. Switzerland. Who can supply more information than this. We have had it several years and. so far. have not been able to get more than the above suppositious details.

 #6 was sent us by W. Lee Fergus who is not a member but probably should be. He thinks it is from a Cummings Machine and it is the first one he has seen like it. Any information any of you can supply will certainly be welcome

#7 is another Horse Shoe Cancel. Richard Russell (#444) has it on cover from Oriskany Falls, N. Y. Color is purple, stamp is #210. Note that this shoe has no flanges at the open ends. Editor's note. a Cover has recently been seen in our sales dept. stock with a horse shoe cancel like this but larger from the same place.

#s 8 - 12 were sent in by William C. Walker (#499). Mr. Walker wonders whether #8 is one device only or two and also whether the irregularity of the keystone is intended or due to an angled strike. Stamp appears to be #158. #9. the Fuller, Pa. star on postal card UX5 is a regular star and appears to be machine made. #10 is on a cover with stamp #184 shown to illustrate the unusual spelling of the town name. Killer is not attached to postmark. This town also used an octagonal town mark at about this time but spelling was normal "Punxatawney", Contents of this cover dated Dec. 28, 1879, #11, this is on Scott #206. Does anyone know this significance of the boot? #12 - this is on cover with #158 and is addressed to "Punxsutawney, Pa," No way of determining year of usage.




