






ROCKPEX '69

FRONT PAGE

On the front page are three covers unrelated to each other, an unusual "Wheel of Fortune" from Ritchie C.H., West Virginia, a "Shield" from Dickson's Cross Roads, La. and a modern Cachet.

While the Shield is similar to #1199 in the Herst-Sampson Book its origin is not the same and it does appear to be slightly different. It is from the collection of Mr. Gene Mickel (#766).

The Cachet is in three colors: Red, white, and blue and was designed by Mr. Mickel for the covers to be sold at an exhibit sponsored by the Easton (Pa.) Philatelic Society and featuring Junior Collectors at the Easton Y.M.C.A. on April 26 from 10:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M. It will be an exact copy of "The First Stars & Stripes" of the United Colonies which was unfurled the same day the Declaration of Independence was read officially from the steps of the courthouse at Easton, Pa. on July 8, 1776. Covers will be franked with the "6¢ Whitehouse" regular stamp and are offered at 25¢ each or five for \$1.00 addressed. A large self-addressed envelope should accompany all orders for unaddressed covers. Order your covers from Gene Mickel, 265 N. Main St., Phillipsburg, N.J. 08865, cash with order please. This cachet is particularly appropriate since the flag was designed, made and unfurled at Easton. It was carried in the "War of 1812" by Capt. Abraham Horn's Company of Easton and has been in the safe keeping of the Easton Public Library since 1821.

"NEW YORK FOREIGN MAIL CANCELLATIONS 1870-1876" by Morrison Waud (#597) and Arthur VanVlissingen (#49)

Collectors of U. S. Postal History, Fancy Cancellations or the Bank Note issue stamps as well as other philatelists will find a world of new knowledge and interest in this new 106 page book by two outstanding specialists about these 150 or more postal obliterations generally recognized as the most beautiful series of all U.S. fancy cancellations of the classic years. Ιt brings up to date the many discoveries and developments since Edwin Milliken's great handbook in 1942 summarized the data then available.

The Waud-Van Vlissingen volume is more comprehensive than anything previously attempted for publication about NYFM. Its profuse illustrations include excellent halftones that show 66 significant covers, 7! single off-cover stamps, 24 multiples, and 5 related subjects.

Accurate full-size tracings reproduce 167 NYFM types including 14 not previously known or proved by covers, and 47 other significant postal markings used in the Foreign Mail Division of the New York General Post Office during the applicable period. A new numbering system of NYFM types pro-vides for the addition of future discoveries without the disruption experienced in earlier numbering series. Conversion tables simplify any problems that collectors might otherwise experience in adopting the new numbers.

Besides a historical summary of all facts known about NYFM, the new book has chapters covering relative rarity of the types, unusual uses, Supplementary Mail, and international postage General information and illustrated examples include domestic cancellations resembling NYFM, cancellations known used both locally and on foreign mail, color cancellations, NYFM on postal stationery, NYFM on forwarded mail, fake cancellations and covers, and famous NYFM corres-

pondences.

"New York Foreign Mail Cancellations 1870-1876" is published under the auspices of the Clarence W. Hennan Memorial Publication Fund of the Collectors Club of Chicago. It can be ordered from dealers, or by letter enclosing check direct from Collectors Club of Chicago, Room 1430, 33 South Clark Street, Chicago, Illinois 60603. Price of the regular edition. in hard cover cloth binding, is \$17.50 postpaid. The limited deluxe edition with slip cover and bound in simulated leather contains a separate pocket containing a set of II transparent acetate looseleaf pages showing all known NYFM types actual size for comparative purposes and study. Price is \$25.00 postpaid.



BARR-FIKE MACHINE CANCELLATIONS by Arthur H. Bond (#505)

In 1896 a new machine cancellation began to appear, having a unique "killer" section, consisting of a series of closely-spaced vertical bars. This was the marking of a high-speed, automatic, motor-driven canceling machine produced by the Barr-Fyke Machine Co. of Kansas City, Mo. Before proceeding with a description of these markings and listing the post offices known to have used the various styles it will be interesting to make a brief review of the Post Office Department's experience with canceling machines previous to 1896.

After a couple of brief experiments with other types, the first practical canceling machines were put into regular service in the Boston and New York post offices in 1876. These machines were made by Thomas and Martin Leavitt, of Everett, Mass. The Leavitt machines did not prove satisfactory on letter mail and imprints are rarely found on envelopes, but they were extensively used on postal cards. In 1879 they were introduced into a dozen other large cities and before 1898 served in about 28 post offices.

The Ethridge brothers founded the American Postal Machines Co. in 1884 and acquired the Leavitts' business. With the permission of the Post Office Department their machines were installed in Boston in 1884, but were not formally leased by the Government until 1889. Although apparently used in 1884 only on third-class mail, they proved highly satisfactory on letter mail, and had broad distribution soon after 1889. In 1894 some of the American machines began to use the well-known "Flag" cancelling dies.

The International Postal Supply Co., of New York, was organized about 1886 by Matthew J. Dolphin and George W. Hey, who took over patents granted in that year to Hey and Emil Laass. Their machines, referred to as "the Hey-Dolphin machines", were used in Brooklyn and Buffalo for short periods in 1888 and soon were leased in considerable numbers for the larger post offices. Early in 1893 International introduced an improved model in New York City, said to have had an average capacity of 40,000 letters perhour with a single operator, as compared with 25,000 per hour and two operators for their previous machine. Nevertheless, their contracts were cancelled in June 1895 and were not renewed until 1898, since when machines of this make have been widely used.

The Barry Postal Supply Co., owned by William Barry, of Oswego, N.Y., made trial installations in Washington and Chicago in 1894 and was probably responsible for the temporary disappearance of International, as large numbers of Barry machines appeared in service in 1895-96. Well over 100 machines of this make were used in 1899 and some continued in service until 1909.

The Barr-Fyke Machine Co.

Several other patents were granted in this field during the early 1890's and some inventors were permitted trial runs of short duration, but the next successful contractors were John H. Barr

and Charles V. Fyke, operating as the Barr-Fyke Machine Co., of Kansas City, Mo. From a study of collected covers, it has been found that the first installations, in Kansas City in 1896 and in Washington in 1897, although continuing over several months, used several different dies in succession. There seems no indication that these machines were actually leased to the Government. We have. therefore, classified their markings as "experimental" types, identifying them as X-1, X-2, X-3, etc. In 1898 we find Barr-Fyke machines in reqular service in Boston, Chicago, St. Louis, Washington and the Madison Square Station in New York. They were also used, probably for short periods, in the New York main office and Station P. Twenty seven machines were leased in 1899 and 1900, increased to at least 30 in 1901. The year 1903 witnessed the introduction of the "Midget" 19 mm. circle die at a few offices and this was the type most used in 1904-05. Only 18 post offices have been recorded as using Barr-Fyke in 1905; the latest known use being at Parkersburg, W. Va. on June 15, 1905. From 1902 to 1905 the Barr-Fyke cancels may be confused with those made by the Doremus machines. These may be easily distinguished by remembering that the vertical bars in Doremus killers never exceeded 16mm. in height. The shortest Barr-Fyke killers were 18 mm, high and were used with the "Midget" 19 mm. circle. while those used with the larger circles were 22 mm. tall.

Classification

As explained above, the obviously experimental types used in 1896-97 at Kansas City and Washington have been designated as Types X-I and X-I3. These markings are illustrated individually in Plates I and 2.

Rather than introduce an entirely new classification series for the regular types, we have continued the system used by Max G. Johl and Paul H. Segnitz, presented in 1951 in the journal "XX Killers", which dealt only with the types in use from 1901 to 1905. This will be familiar to most of the older collectors.

The system is based on the use of a letter to indicate the type of postmark or dater circle and a number for the type of killer or cancellation die. Letters and numbers were assigned in approximately chronological order as various styles appear. Thus each complete marking may be described by a duplex combination code, such as Type C-121, indicating Type C postmark with Type 121 killer. Missing numbers are reserved for possible future discoveries. No changes have been made in code designation for the types dealt, with by Johl and Segnitz. Where either postmark or killer shows origin at a branch station the letter S is added to the basic letter or number. The suffixes R and X are used for receiving and service markings respectively. The postmark and killer types described in the text are illustrated in Plates 3 and 4.

Various combinations used as receiving marks or supplementary service are dealt with in a series following description of the regular cancellation types.

The Barr-Fyke "Flag" cancels, which were used from 1900 to 1905 for short periods at several offices, are covered in a later instalment. The markings produced by a Barr-Fyke machine that was used at the Paris Exposition in 1900 will also be described.


