

THE UNITED STATES TWO CENT RED BROWN OF 1883-1887 by EDWARD L. WILLARD

For some time reports of the progress of this two volume work by Edward L. Willard (#125) have appeared in our NEWS. Through the kindness of the Author, our Library now has both volumes.

Since he has spent many years studying this stamp and its use we believe Mr. Willard is qualified to write these books. We doubt if anyone else is as well qualified.

Volume I concerns the Stamp, Historical Background, Design & Preparation, Printing Contracts, Plate Varieties both constant and nonconstant and Special Usages. Volume II considers the Cancellations. Throughout both Volumes the text is complete and understandable. Illustrations in both are many and well executed.

These two books are examples not only of the Author's wide knowledge and years of work but also of the excellent work done by Lindquist Publications, the Printer.

UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN CLASS COVERS

Our President, Robert Schoen, has an interesting project started (see his ad on Page 27.) Beginning in 1862 each Graduating Class at Michigan chose a "Class Emblem" and also a motto either in Latin or Greek. They had envelopes and Letterheads made showing these Emblems and Mottoes. Some are quite fancy being printed in Gold Ink, others were in Blue or Black. This went on until 1888 at least. Bob is looking for examples of all of them.

He also has another Ann Arbor project started, an exhaustive study of the Postmark Canceller used from Sept. 1855 to April 1863. We hope to have an article from him on this subject for a later issue. A cover showing this Canceller was lot #99! in the Siegel sale of Dec. 9-12, 1869.

Wylie H. Flack (#603) received the USCC Certificate at the 23rd annual Philatelic Exhibition of the Frankford Arsenal Stamp Club for his Showing of Civil War Patriotic Covers, used and also "Best in Show" award for his "The World's First Commemorative Stamp".

SALES DEPARTMENT

Philatelic Sales Departments have had, for some time, difficulty in securing insurance to cover mail shipments. APS SPA & TMPS have been Until the latter part of carrying their own. April we have had coverage but that has now been cancelled. Since we are unable to get another policy and since the Sales Department appears to be an important activity it has become necessary that we put into operationa system for carrying our own Insurance. Using plans of other philatelic organizations as models we have developed a plan for ourselves. This is now in effect and a number of circuits are out under the new regulations.

It has become necessary that members be responsible for full value of circuits while in their possession and for forwarding as directed to the next on the list. We now ask that all shipments be insured for \$200.00 which is the most allowed by the P. O. Dept. on 3rd or 4th This costs now 60¢ instead of the 30¢ we have been in the habit of spending for the \$50.00 insurance we have been buying. Also, since the value of our circuits usually is much more than \$200.00 we are asking each member of the circuit group to add 35¢ to his remittance to cover cost of insuring the excess under the Club's own insurance Fund. Thus we hope to build up a fund large enough to cover such losses. Meanwhile the officers and the members of the Board have given us permission to borrow from the General Fund if necessary.

A new letter of instructions became necessary. This has been prepared and is being used. We hope all of you will follow those instructions. It is impossible to be too emphatic in urging promptness in processing the circuits, accuracy in checking and reporting and care in wrapping securely. Also all circuits out at the time needed to have their instructions amended. This was done by writing the proper member of each circuit group and sending an amendment to be attached to the letter of instructions. Seventeen such circuits are cut still. Please insure each one you forward for \$200.00 and retain your insurance receipt until you know the package has reached its destination.

Always we have accepted for the sales department stock whatever members cared to take the trouble to prepare and send in. We expect to continue to do so, but would urge members to use care in pricing so that the material will have a chance to sell instead of just going for a ride and also to bear in mind the minimum costs on each sales book or cover container, not to enter material too low priced to return anything to the owner for his trouble,

Some members have the idea that we do not accept unused USA Postage. This is not so. Stamps with full gum will be accepted and are preferred to checks for small amounts. Please do not overload us nor send in any special purpose stamps like airs or special delivery. We can use any reasonable amount of regular issues up to and including the \$1,00 values.

Even more than before, it is necessary that we have in our stock fine stamps and covers reasonably priced so that members can justify paying the added expense to get our circuits. Sales books to hold 120 stamps are still 10ϕ each, books for 12 covers designed particularly for more expensive items are 20ϕ each and cover envelopes for 20 covers are 5 for 25ϕ . If you have material you no longer need please prepare it and send it in. They may be secured from the sales manager, C. D. Root, 855 Cove Way, Denver, Colo. 80209.






