

Another interesting Black Jack Cover from the collection of Paul J. Wolf (#743)

Cover, New York to "Saint" Francisco, the stamps cancelled with the double-lined CDS, Apr 21,1865, and target killers. Two Blackjacks and a pair of the 3¢ No. 65 provide the 10¢ rate. On the reverse is a circular San Francisco handstamp with the date 14 1865 Jun (the year date inverted)the at the bottom, "ADVERTISED." A docketing on the face states "Rec'd July 6 65, Answered Sept 2, 65. There is no formal notation as to any fee being collected for the advertising, but partially obscured by the docketing is the numeral 4, which may indicate  $4\phi$ , at  $1\phi$  each for 4 insertions a week apart, that is: June 14, 21, 28 and July 5, with the cover picked up by the addressee on July 6.



#### INDEX

For some time we have been mentioning in the NEWS the possibility of having soon an index of our publications. We have it now. Mr. Joseph D. Hahn (#734) and Mr. Chester M. Smith, Jr. (#881) have completed the work of supplying us with an index of the first nine volumes. There are one hundred pages, and, since a computer was used in the preparation, just any three ring binder will not be satisfactory. As soon as we are able to secure a proper binder we shall add it to the Library list. We plan now to bring it up-to-date whenever we complete a volume.

As they worked on this Index, Mr. Hahn and Mr. Smith recognized the fact that the terminology used in describing Cancellations was, in many cases, not as definitely descriptive as it perhaps should be. They ask that members make an effort to devise some system which will be not only simple but also will divide the Cancellations into groups with descriptive and easily recognizable names.

#### PHILADELPHIA, U.S.A. POST OFFICES

There were, in all, ten Philadelphia Post Offices in the United States according to the Official Postal Guides, with nine at the turn of the Century and five still functioning, through 1962. They were, in the approximate order of their establishment.:

in Philadelphia Co. Pa. estab. before 1700 17 Jefferson Co. N.Y. before 3/31/1825 Monroe Co., later Loudon, Tenn. " Hancock Co. Inc. estab. 1851 approx. Van Buren Co. lowa 11 Marion Co. Mo. Neshoba Co. Miss. Darlington Co. S. Car. before 7/13/1857 Cass Co. 111. 1884 approx. Isard Co. Ark. 1901

Wylie H. Flack (#603) has been seeking examples of these Cancellations on Cover. So far five (Pa., N. Y., Miss., Mo., Tenn.) have been located. The history of the establishment of each office, excepting Philadelphia, Pa. which has been written up many times, is being developed. Information regarding any of these Post Offices is earnestly desired. Please submit Covers on any basis-sale, trade, or loan for verification. #### ANN ARBOR

As noted in the July NEWS our President, Robert H, Schoen, is working currently on two projects connected with the postal history of Ann Arbor, Mich. First Class Covers, see his ad. Second, a study of the Ann Arbor Postmarks used during the period 1855 to 1863. Although he has some 250 covers of this period he never has seen one dated October, November or December of 1860. Covers showing these months of this year are desired, either for purchase or for borrowing for verification. It is entirely possible that such covers exist and that no year date appeared. Even so Mr. Schoen probably could prove the year if the month appears in the postmark.

#### U. S. 20th CENTURY NUMERAL CANCELLATIONS by: Edith R. Doane(#847)

Most postal historians are fully cognizant of the mediocre and very indistinct postal markings on first class mail at the turn of the 20th Century. The Post Office Department, too, was well aware of the many inadequacies. After five years of testing new equipment and special inks, it issued an entirely different general style of postmarking device in two distinct Types early in 1903; a third followed three years later.

It was a rubber duplex outfit and its chief characteristic was a number within its canceller bars. Unlike the current Rural Free Delivery cancellation, the new outfit had a circular postmark section. Each was used widely and independently of the other between 1903 - 1910.

These numeral cancellations seem to have escaped the attention of research specialists - at least I have found no bibliography on them. So, while examples still exist, may I place "on the record" some descriptive evidence I have compiled, augmented by collection data from about 7500 specimens.

The first testing of these new rubber postmarking stamps and new special cancelling ink for use with them, was made during the first six months of 1903 in 500 of the smallest fourth class post offices, whose gross receipts were under \$500 per annum. Based on their successful use, 10,711 more offices were supplied with them the next fiscal year and 9000 more received them the following year. Gradually distribution had included the larger fourth class offices, even some of the second and third class for additional testing.

Newly-established fourth class offices received these devices, as did those of short duration and those existing offices whose devices needed replacement for some reasor. They were located in all the states, the Ir an and Oklahoma Territories, Alaska, the Canai Zone and Puerto Rico. Numbers within the bars are I-18; I-4 were used most frequently, 5-9 occasionally, and IO and above very rarely.

For most convenient classification and identification, the canceller-bar sections have been separated into three Types because of their differing numbers and arrangements. Complete specimen markings with postmarks can usually--but not always as in the case of Type 2-provide accurate clues to Typing.

Markings for Types I & 2 indicate that they were started experimentally at about the same time since the earliest recorded dates (so far) for both Types are in April 1903, while the start of Type 3 was in January 1906.

Space here does not permit of the publication of these checklists but a list could be compiled of the 500 group of Type I if members are interested and would co-operate.

Type I Easliest recorded date: WARREN, OREGON Apr 12 1903 No. 2

Canceller Section: 5 thin narrowly-spaced parallel bars 12 mm. high, sometimes contoured, sometimes straight at the left. Number 1, 2 or 3, 11-12 mm. tall, bisects the three middle bars.

Postmark section: circle diameter 28-30 mm. Some short office names have broad squatty letters  $2\frac{1}{2}$  mm. tall; other lettering for longer names is thinner and shorter.

Oddity: Watch for specimens showing that Type I device had been replaced by a Type 2 or even a Type 3, usually with a different number.








#### THAMESPEX 170
