SESCAL 170

At SESCAL '70 the USCC Certificate was awarded to Mr. Jerome Schwimmer for his exhibit of "Los Angeles Postal History". This exhibit also received the "Grand Award" and the "Federation Plaque" for "Best by a Federation Member".

Members of USCC receiving awards at this Exhibition were:

Walton E. Tinsley (#376) the UPSS Grand Award, the Australasian Specialist Medal and the Postal Stationery Sectional Award for his "Tasmania Postal History".

Clark H. Stevens (#685), a UPSS award for "The Columbian Exposition" and a Bronze Medal for "The Glory of the Imperfect".

William H. Bauer (#834), the APS Medal & the Postal History Section Award for "Colorado, #859-1900".

Dr. Charles L. Wunsch (#760), a Silver Medal for "First Postal Cards of France".

Frank B. Stratton (#487), a Silver Medal for "The Leavitt Machine Cancellations".

Perhaps we should mention that all these members of USCC are members also of United Postal Stationery Society whose annual meeting was held at SESCAL '70.

U. S. 20TH CENTURY NUMERAL CANCELLATIONS by Edith R. Doare (#847)

Type 2: Earliest recorded date: ABBOTTSTOWN, PA. Apr 6, 1903 No. ?

Canceller section: 4 sets of twin open parallel bars about 14 mm. high, more often contoured than straight at left. Numbers seen used are 1-18, shorter and thicker than those of Type I and several have more than one style.

Postmark section: Circle diameter usually 28 mm. but up to 30 mm. Lettering largely follows that of Type I in styles, sizes and spacings.

There are many examples of changes from Type 2 to Type 3, either with the same number or with different numbers. Also, after extended use, the bars came very clogged with ink and have a noticeable tendency to look quite solid, thus making this true Type identification difficult. Many specimem's show use through the late 1920s.

Here are two more interesting covers using "Black Jacks" from the collection of Mr. Paul J. Wolf (#743). #I shows three strikes of the N. York. Steamship handstamp cancel 3 copies of the 3ϕ , #65 and a Black Jack, #73, which make up a $I\phi$ overpayment of the $IO\phi$ rate proper for this cover.

The No York. Steamship cancel was used on mail incoming from the Caribbean and Mexico, and brought to the New York Post Office for mailing. This cover is especially interesting because there is no trace of a date in any one of the three strikes of the handstamp. Probably a Clerk's oversight. That the cover originated outside the United States is attested by the "U.S." in the address. Veazie, Maine, is a small place north-East of Bangor.

#2 is a cut- down legal size cover, sent from Mobile, Ala., to New Orleans, La., in the post-Civil War period. The cover carries three Black Jacks, #73, and a pair of the 3¢, #65, to total 12¢ in postage, but this was still not enough, and one of the Post Offices involved, probably Mobile, struck the Due 6 in circle marking to collect the shortage. Obviously this was a legal communication of some weight, in both senses of the word.






This illustration was sent in by Warren R. Bower (#751). He has it on a Cover with a 3¢ Green and a 3¢ #j3 due both stamps tied with this killer, black ink. Corner card of the Cover is "Huntington Gas Light Co., Huntington, Ind." Address is "Mr. John F. Gainer. Palatine, Cook Co.!!l." Apparently a local mailing one rate short. Year may have been 1882.

The Cancel is not listed in HERST-SAMPSON, It is illustrated in Edward L. Willard's book on the 2¢ Brown Volume 2. Number assigned is 120 but origin listed as unknown. What probably is the same Cancellation was shown in the March 1959 issue of our NEWS Page 62, illustration #30 in a page of Cancels from James R. Littleton(#363). Origin listed as "Unknown" here also.

The slant of the "0" appears to be the most evident means of identifying this Cancel,


COLLECTOR'S CLUB OF NEW YORK
