



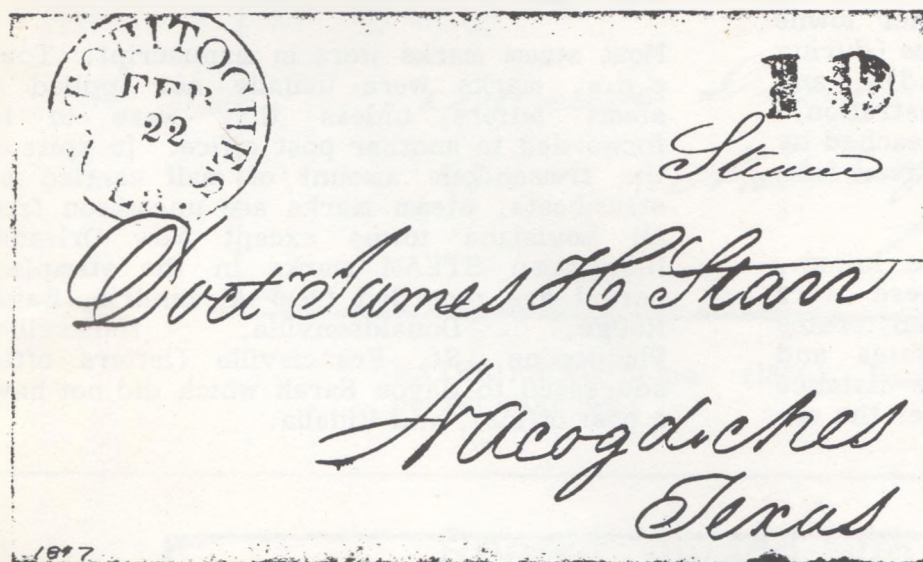

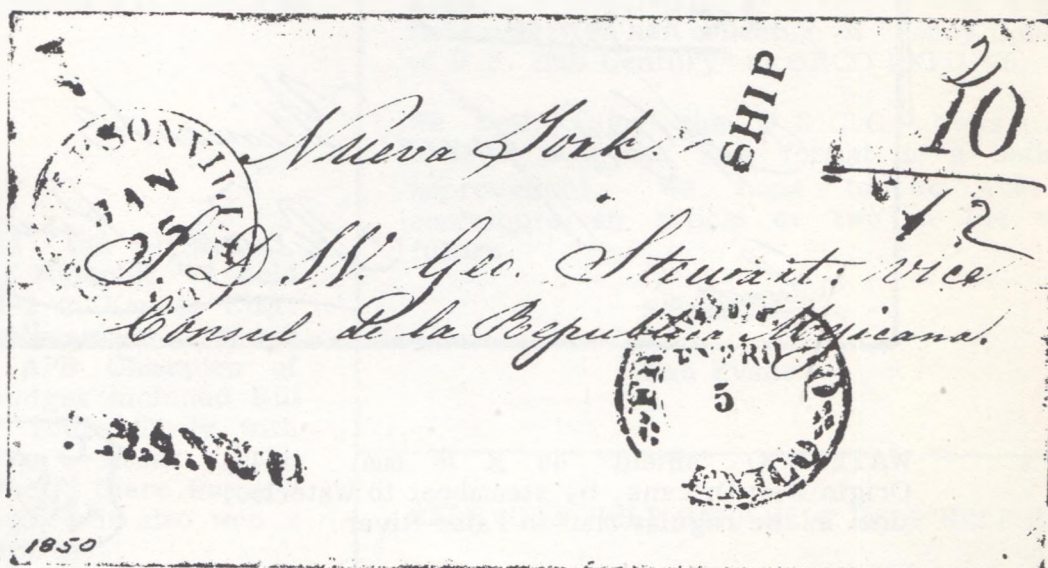
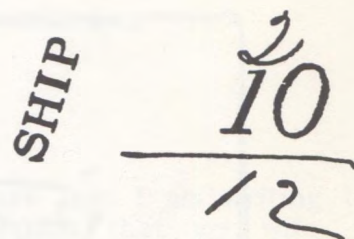

# LOUISIANA STEAM AND SHIP LETTERS

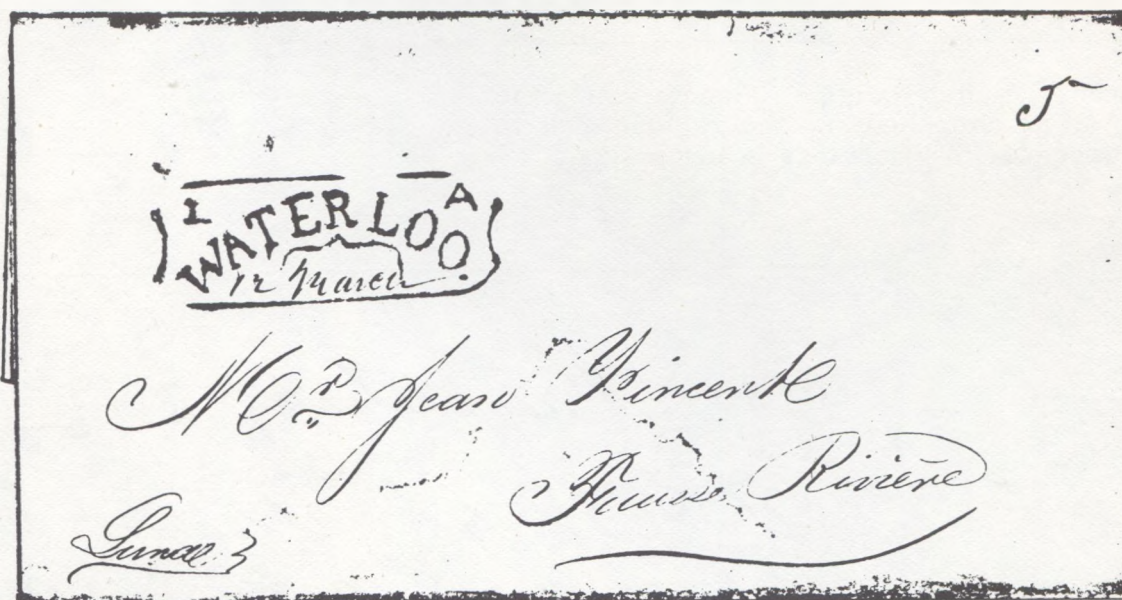

Except for New Orleans, Louisiana SHIP markings are exceedingly scarce. Thus far the author has noted only two other towns using handstamp ship marks -- Balize (during the Orleans Territory period) and Pattersonville (see illustration). Pattersonville (now Patterson) was reached by ships coming up the Atchafalaya River from the Gulf of Mexico to Bayou Teche.

Early manuscript "ship" marks are known, generally in the 1820's, but these were markings applied to steamboat mail; rates charged were both ship letter rates and regular postage rates figured on the distance traveled by the steamboat. Even after the es-

tablishment of the "steam" mail category, considerable confusion existed on the part of postmasters as to just what the proper rate might be.

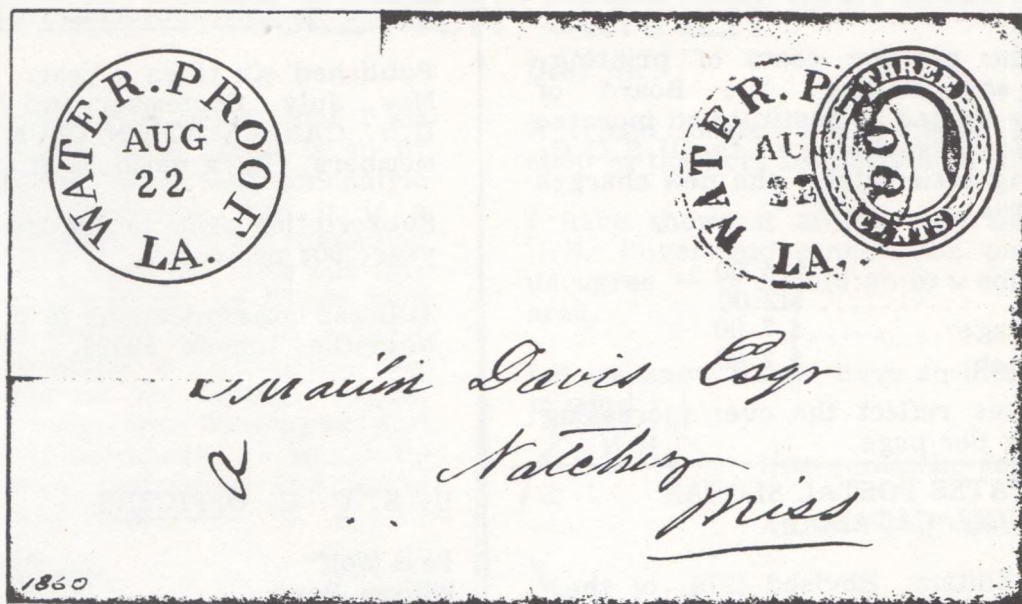
Most steam marks were in manuscript. Town c.d.s. marks were usually not applied to steam letters unless they were to be forwarded to another post office. In spite of the tremendous amount of mail carried by steamboats, steam marks are uncommon from all Louisiana towns except New Orleans. Handstamp STEAM marks in the stampless period are recorded from Alexandria, Baton Rouge, Donaldsonville, Marksville, Plaquemine, St. Francisville (letters often addressed to Bayou Sarah which did not have a post office), and Vidalia.

## QUESTION CORNER

Dear Sir:

I enclose a photocopy of a cancel that I am attempting to identify. The stamp is an 87 struck with a numeral "11" in four concentric rings. My first thought was that it is a Canadian, but comparison with the Canadian "11" (Cornwall, U.C.) does not bear out this hypothesis. The diameter of the Black Jack ring is about 20 mm and the Canadian is about 22 mm. Also the numeral is shorter and the rings closer together on the former. I have also ruled out late usage from Washington and Thurn and Taxis (illustrated). I would be happy to send along the stamp and would greatly appreciate any ideas.

## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir:

Please allow me to comment on some of the material in circuit #1103. In envelope #845 were six items with stamps and/or covers torn or damaged and they were marked reduced to 75¢ each?

In envelope #1311, the first eight covers are disasters.

If you do not at present have it, the club should give you the authority to refuse material of this type. It does nothing but degrade the overall quality of the circuits. I for one refuse to buy any of it and I resent having to tally up and pay postage to forward it to the next member who is in turn imposed upon to do the same. Perhaps it would help if you would suggest to the owners that it is in their best interest to submit good material at fair prices. The fact that many items are going unsold should tell these people something.

I was sorry to learn that you received a circuit damaged that had been underinsured. There is no excuse for a member to underinsure. Perhaps it would help to stipulate the rules a little more forcefully on the letter enclosed with each circuit.

Editor's Note: I do not know whether or not I have authority to screen material, but I am not attempting to do so from the standpoint of returning submitted material to a member without putting it into a circuit.

However, I have attempted to screen circuits so that every member has an opportunity to receive both good and bad material. We do not have enough of the former to make up only circuits of good items. At the same time since some 75 - 80% of all material submitted (except First Day Covers) sells, it means that what one member terms poor is acceptable to another.

Further I do not want to chase away the members who submit material for the circuits. At the present time some 20 - 25 members submit all of the material used on the circuits for over 300 members. If I start screening material, I might well chase away those members who we need desperately to keep the

circuits going. For every portion of poor material received we normally obtain an excess of better material from that member. I just do not feel that I can sit in judgment.

Finally I am undoubtedly to blame for the material which you consider unwelcome. One of our members failed to follow the rules and sent a circuit through the mail with insufficient insurance. Consequently the

U.S.C.C. suffered a loss of over \$300.00. I have tried to salvage what was not destroyed by water by pricing at 50% or less of what originally was set forth. Perhaps my pricing was in error, but I tried to value it in a manner that would be fair, but also allow the U.S.C.C. some opportunity to recover its loss -- as the members originally submitting the material were paid the full amount out of the U.S.C.C. Insurance Fund.

Dear Sir:

I am grateful indeed to you and the Board of U.S.C.C. for my "Life" Membership as notified in your letter recently received. I accepted your selection of me as Chairman of the Membership Committee and was glad to do what I could to continue its active status following Mr. Root's death.

I am sorry that it was necessary for me to refuse continued active involvement in the affairs of the U.S.C.C. due to probable changes in my life-style this year and a reduction in my philatelic activities. I hope to be able to move back to Massachusetts this fall and will inform you if and when this becomes effective.

We all owe you appreciation for the efficient job you have been doing for the U.S.C.C.

I have often thought of stopping my subscription, maybe because of age and inactivity in collecting, but not with each issue getting better and better.

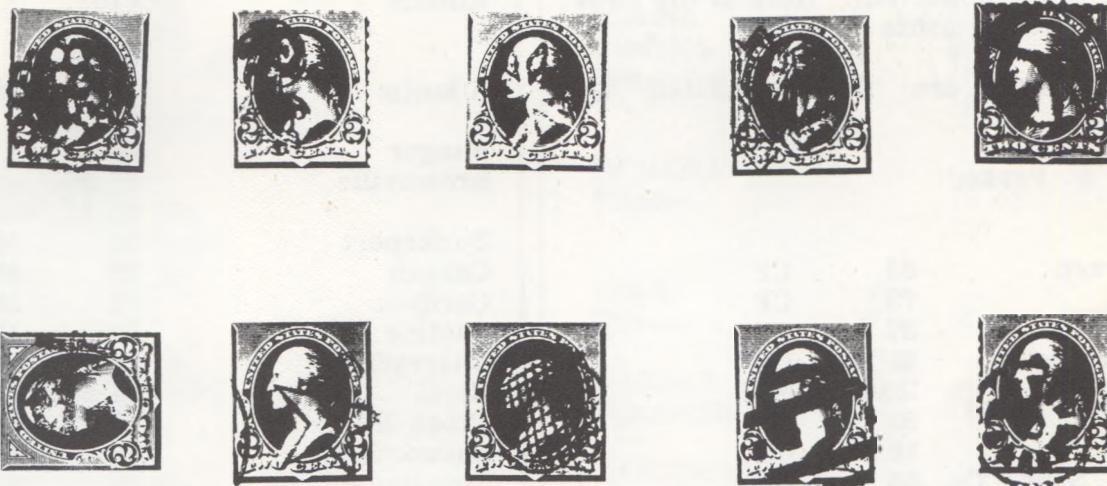
